Suspended Programs - 2017

Broad Field Science

- Demonstrated lack of student interest. Low enrollment in fall 2017 (n = 8), with most at the senior level (n = 5)
- Low producing program. The 5 year graduation average is 2.4 per year. Identified as a low producing degree program on the UW System list.
- Excessive credits to degree. New freshmen and transfer students who complete the program accrue over 138 credits to degree.
- Most students (n = 6) have chosen to double major.

Broad Field Science Teaching

- Demonstrated lack of student interest. Low enrollment in fall 2017 (n = 2), with ALL students at the senior level.
- Low producing program. The 5 year graduation average is 1 per year.
- Excessive credits to degree. Transfer students who complete the program accrue over 138 credits to degree.

Chemistry: Forensic

- Demonstrated lack of student interest. Low enrollment in fall 2017 (n = 7), with only
 one freshman.
- Low producing program. The 5 year graduation rate is 1.4 per year. The Chemistry major is on the UW System "watch list."
- Excessive credits to degree. Transfer students who complete the program accrue over 138 credits to degree.

Communicating Arts: Journalism

- Demonstrated lack of student interest. Low enrollment in fall 2017 (n = 10), with only one freshman and one sophomore in the pipeline. 72% drop in enrollment over 10 years
- Low producing program. The 5 year graduation average is 4.2 per year.

Communicating Arts: Media Studies

- Demonstrated lack of student interest. Low enrollment in fall 2017 (n = 5), with only 1 freshman in the pipeline.
- Low producing program. The 5 year graduation average is 4.2 per year.

Political Science

- Declining student interest. Only 6 freshmen and sophomores enrolled in fall 2017, with a majority of students at the junior and senior level. 45% drop in enrollment over 10 years.
- Excessive credits to degree. New freshmen and transfer students who complete the program accrue over 138 credits to degree.

Sociology

- Demonstrated lack of student interest. Low enrollment in fall 2017 (n = 9), with no freshmen and most (n = 6) at the senior level.
- Declining enrollments over time. 80% drop in enrollment over 10 years.
- Excessive credits to degree. New freshmen and transfer students who complete the program accrue over 138 credits to degree.
- Most students (n = 5) have chosen to double major.

Theatre

- On the 2014 Program Prioritization "watch list."
- **Demonstrated lack of student interest.** Low enrollment in fall 2017 (n = 15), with most at the junior and senior levels (n = 10). Consistently low enrollments over a ten year period.
- Low producing program. The 5 year graduation average is 3.2 per year, and this program has is on the UW System list of low producing programs.
- Excessive credits to degree. New freshmen and transfer students who complete the program accrue over 138 credits to degree.
- Most students (n = 8) have chosen to double major.

Master of Arts: Art Therapy

- Demonstrated lack of student interest. Low enrollment in fall 2017 (n = 10).
 Consistently low enrollments over a ten year period.
- Changing licensure and accreditation standards. New standards indicate the need to reallocate significant university resources to ensure that future students can practice art therapy after earning their degree.
